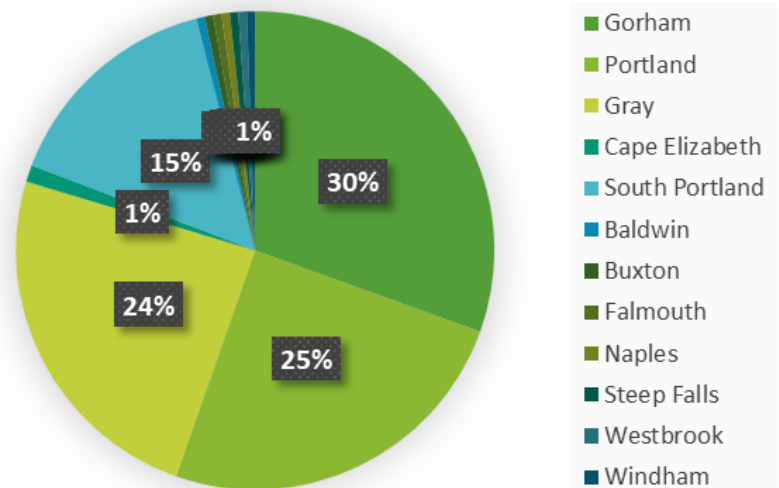
Community Agriculture Planning Survey Results

OVERVIEW

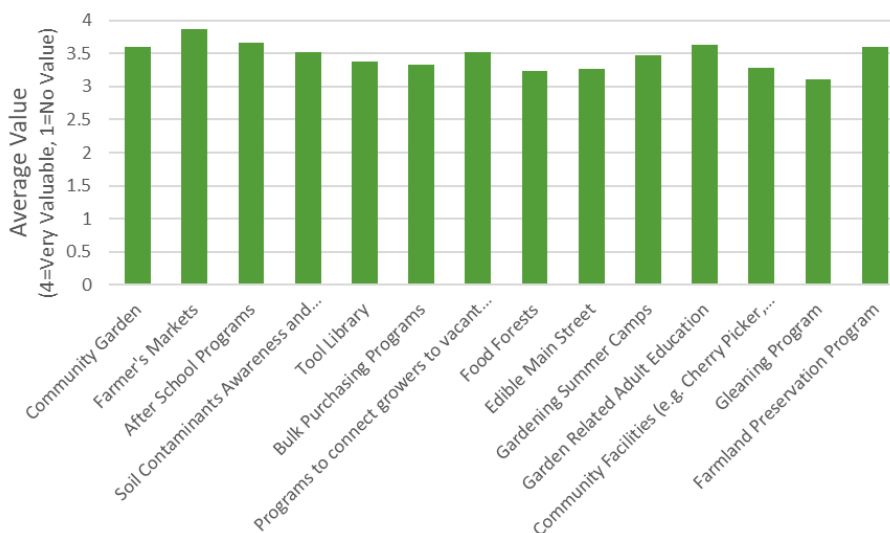
This survey sought to obtain input from 4 communities, Gray, Gorham, Portland, and South Portland as to what community agriculture programs would be of most value.

Average Value of Community Agriculture Programs



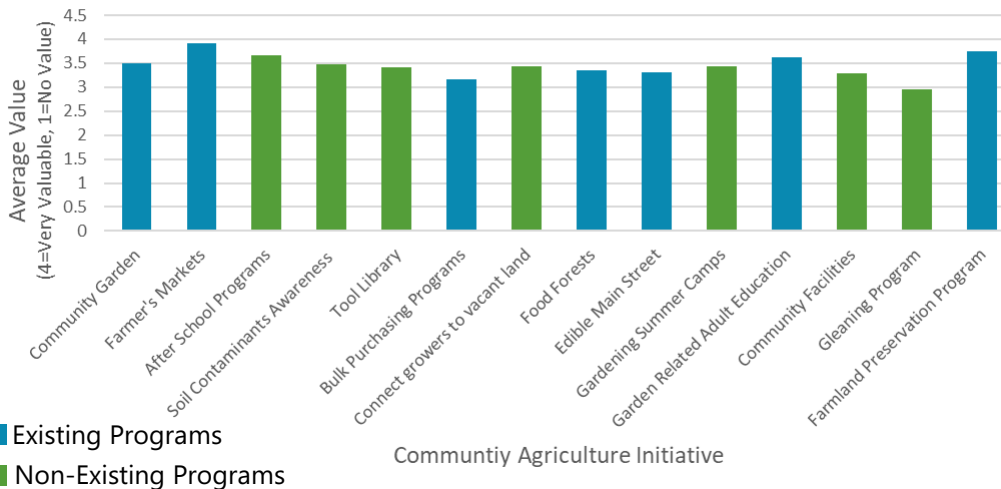

Average Value of Community Agriculture Programs For Gorham

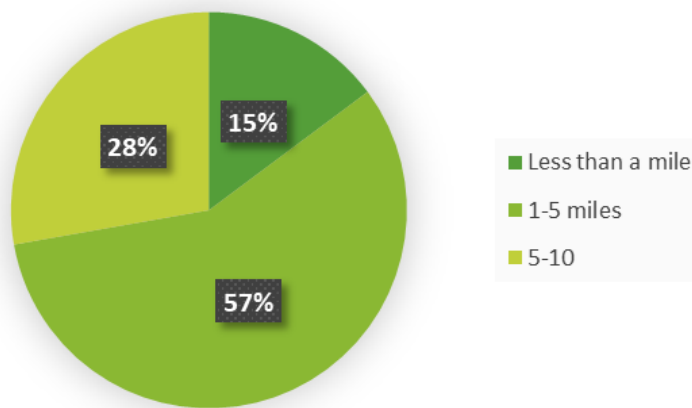


Locally Sourced Produce Value

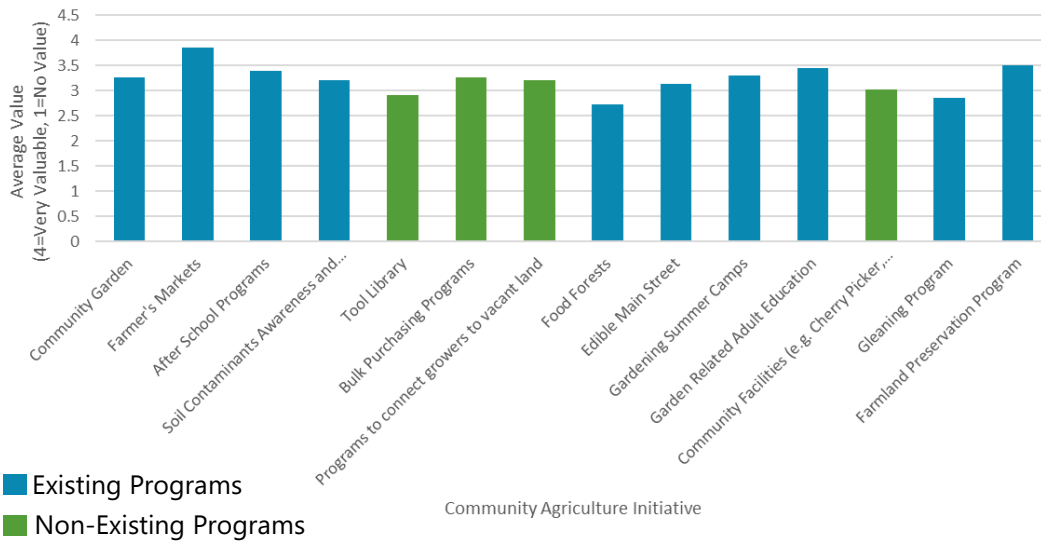
- I love seeing community gardens in Robie Park.

Average Value of Community Agriculture Programs For Gray

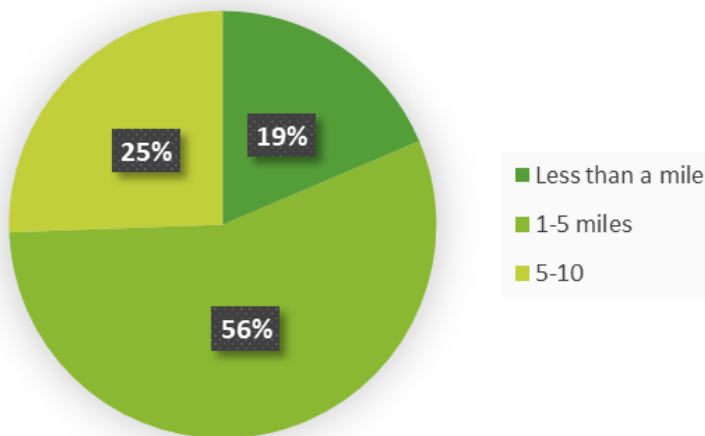


Locally Sourced Produce Value

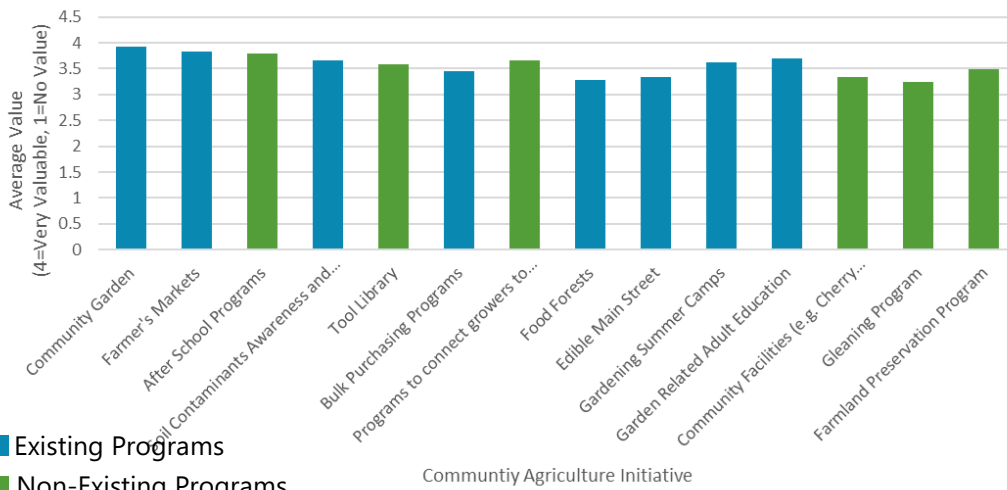

Average Value of Community Agriculture Programs For South Portland

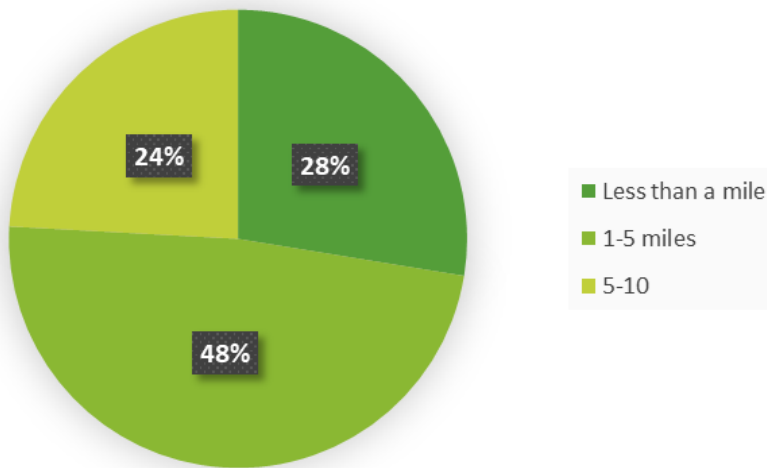


Locally Sourced Produce Value

Additional Comments

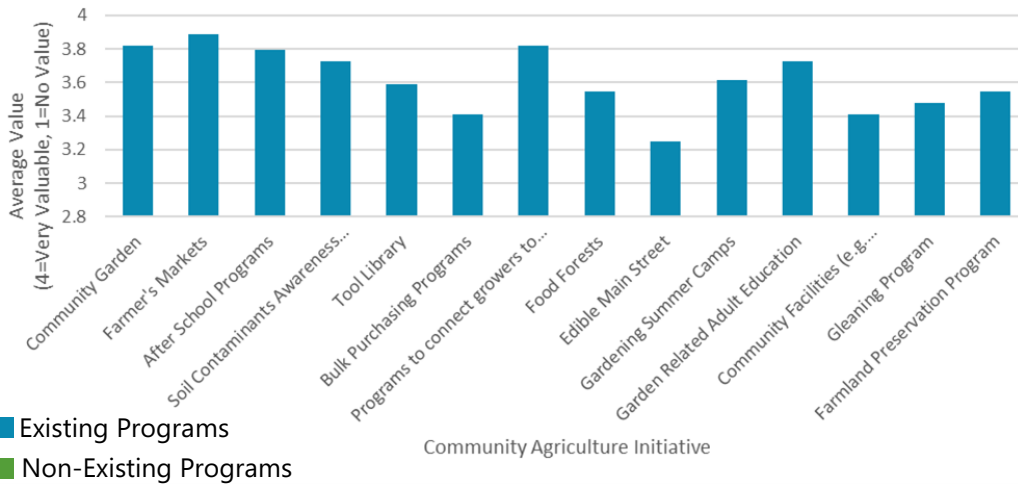
- South Portland would greatly benefit from more of these in our city, paired with the plans to expand and preserve green space.

Average Value of Community Agriculture Programs For Portland

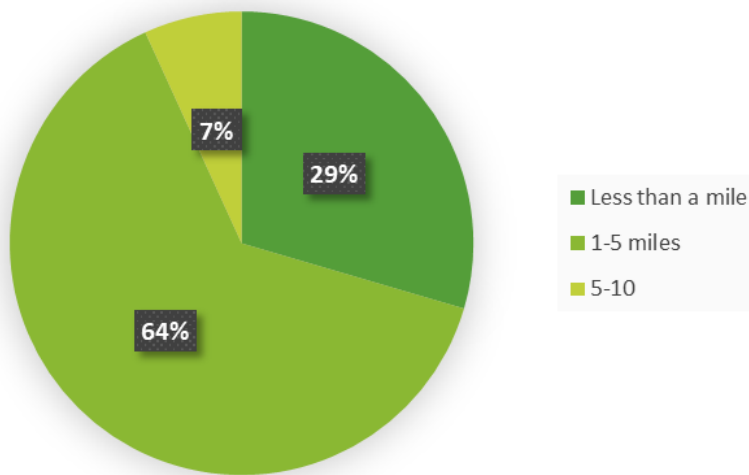


Locally Sourced Produce Value
